If something contracts it gets smaller.

Contractions are words that have been made smaller by missing out letters.

An apostrophe like this 'goes in place of the missing letter or letters.

We use the Present Simple:

for habits and actions that we do regularly:

He visits his friends every Sunday.

She goes to school by bus.

for general truths:

The sun rises in the east.

for permanent situations:

He lives in Athens.

Time expressions used with the Present Simple:

Every day / week / year / Friday etc. On Mondays, at the weekend etc. In the afternoons etc. In winter / spring etc. Always, sometimes, often,etc.

Formation of the third person singular he, she, it

Verbs which end in -ss, -sh, -ch, -x, -o take -es:

I watch - he watches

I brush - she brushes

Verbs which end in **consonant** +**y** change the -**y** to -**i** and take -**es**:

I cry - she cries

Verbs which end in vowel + y simply take -s:

I play - he plays

Note:

In the **negative** and the **interrogative** we drop the ending -s of the **third person singular**:

→ He does not play — → Does he play?

He plays.
